Suppose a non-scrubbed person inadvertently enters the sterile field. In that case, it is no longer sterile, and steps will be needed to re-achieve sterility. This may include opening a new pack, changing surgical gloves, changing gowns, and various other measures depending on how sterility was disrupted and to what degree.

When considering a gown:

*The gown is sterile from the chest to the level of the sterile field, such as the table.

*Gown sleeves are considered sterile from two inches above the elbow to the top of the cuff's edge.

*The neckline, cuffed portion of the gown, and shoulders, because they can easily contain sweat, causing loss of sterility, are never considered sterile.

*No one can constantly watch their back; thus, the back of the gown is never considered sterile.
