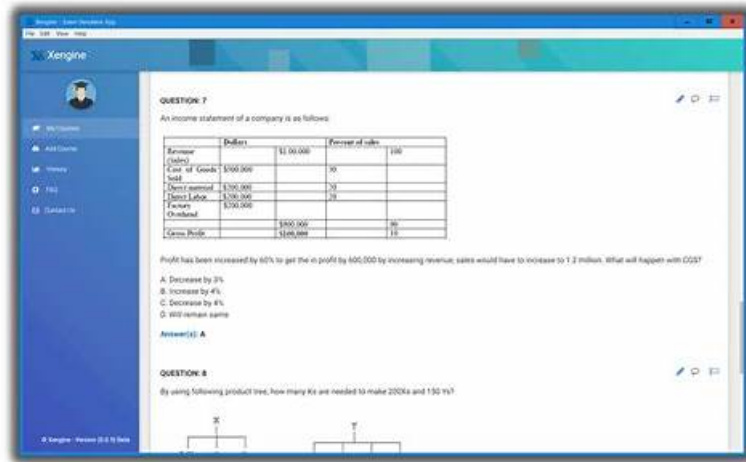

Topic	Details
Topic 1	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Assessing CMMC Level 2 Practices: This section of the exam measures skills of cybersecurity assessors in evaluating whether organizations meet the required practices of CMMC Level 2. It emphasizes applying CMMC model constructs, understanding model levels, domains, and implementation, and using evidence to determine compliance with established cybersecurity practices.
Topic 2	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> CMMC Level 2 Assessment Scoping: This section of the exam measures skills of cybersecurity assessors and revolves around determining the proper scope of a CMMC assessment. It involves analyzing and categorizing Controlled Unclassified Information (CUI) assets, interpreting the Level 2 scoping guidelines, and making accurate judgments in scenario-based exercises to define what assets and systems fall within assessment boundaries.
Topic 3	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> CMMC Assessment Process (CAP): This section of the exam measures skills of compliance professionals and tests knowledge of the full assessment lifecycle. It covers the steps needed to plan, prepare, conduct, and report on a CMMC Level 2 assessment, including the phases of execution and how to document and follow up on findings in alignment with DoD and CMMC-AB expectations.
Topic 4	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Evaluating Organizations Seeking Certification (OSC) against CMMC Level 2 Requirements: This section of the exam measures skills of cybersecurity assessors and focuses on evaluating the environments of organizations seeking certification at CMMC Level 2. It covers understanding differences between logical and physical settings, recognizing constraints in cloud, hybrid, on-premises, single, and multi-site environments, and knowing what environmental exclusions apply for Level 2 assessments.

NEW QUESTION # 147

You are a CCA conducting a CMMC Level 2 assessment for an OSC. During the assessment, you discover that the OSC has implemented a practice using a temporary workaround due to a recent system failure. The workaround meets the practice's objectives, but it is not documented in their System Security Plan (SSP). How should you evaluate this evidence?

- A. Document the lack of SSP inclusion as an evidence gap and assess the practice based on the workaround's effectiveness.
- B. Score the practice as "NOT MET" due to the absence of documentation in the SSP.
