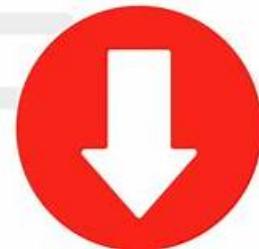

\* Responsible individuals must be identified to show governance and ownership of measurement functions.
