Establish RTOs and RPOs
Process owner approves accuracy
Obtain support from Top Mgmt
Publish results

Operational BIA Process Answer- Similar to Tactical BIA, BUT focus is on individual activities
Could be at the departmental or single business unit level

Identify/prioritize activities
Quantify required resources
