


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## AACN Critical Care Nursing Exam Sample Questions (Q26-Q31):

### NEW QUESTION # 26

A pediatric patient with a complex, chronic condition has a multidisciplinary care team. The patient's family expresses frustration with receiving conflicting information from different team members.

Which of the following is the most appropriate action for a nurse to take?

- A. Reassure the family this is common with complex cases and encourage them to focus on the goal
- B. Recommend the family direct all of their questions to the attending physician to minimize confusion
- C. Provide the family with written information summarizing the key points from each specialist
- D. **Arrange a team meeting to clarify the treatment plan prior to meeting with the family**

**Answer: D**

Explanation:

Effective communication is a pillar of ethical and professional nursing practice. In complex care situations, coordination and unified messaging are vital to support family understanding and reduce distress.

"When families express confusion or frustration due to inconsistent communication, it is the nurse's responsibility to advocate for a coordinated approach by facilitating interdisciplinary collaboration and clarity of plan." (Referenced from CCRN Pediatric - Professional Caring and Ethical Practice: Communication and Advocacy) Arranging a team meeting promotes collaboration, consistency, and ensures that the family receives accurate, unified information.

### NEW QUESTION # 27

After the nurse has taught the parents of a 5-year-old boy who has leukemia how to talk with their child about death and dying, which of the following would indicate that the parents have age-appropriate expectations about their child's reaction to his impending death:

- A. "He will understand how much his siblings will miss him."
- B. "He will accept his death as caused by his disease."
- C. "He is too young to understand what is happening to him."
- D. **"He might think he can cause his death because he has misbehaved."**

**Answer: D**

Explanation:

Explanation: A 5-year-old child is in the preoperational stage of cognitive development and thinks of death as temporary. Also, for a child this age, thinking about behavior often is believed to be magical; thus, the child may think that his behavior can cause death. Generally, children under 3 years of age are unable to differentiate death from temporary separation and are unable to understand what is happening.

### NEW QUESTION # 28

An infant with bronchiolitis is intubated and mechanically ventilated. ABG:

- \* pH: 7.31
- \* PaCO<sub>2</sub>: 62 mmHg
- \* PaO<sub>2</sub>: 50 mmHg
- \* HCO<sub>3</sub>: 26 mEq/L

Which radiologic finding is most likely?

- A. Pneumothorax
- B. **Hypoinflation**
- C. Atelectasis
- D. Pleural effusion

**Answer: B**

Explanation:

Bronchiolitis causes lower airway obstruction, air trapping, and hypoventilation. On chest radiographs, hypoinflation (low lung volumes) and peribronchial thickening are common. The ABG shows respiratory acidosis and hypoxemia, consistent with bronchiolar obstruction and hypoinflation.

"In bronchiolitis, hypoinflation and peribronchial thickening are typical CXR findings. ABG shows respiratory acidosis with hypoxemia in severe cases requiring ventilation." (Referenced from CCRN Pediatric - Direct Care: Pulmonary, Bronchiolitis and Ventilatory Support)

**NEW QUESTION # 29**

The parents of a teenager with terminal neuroblastoma are preparing to withdraw life-sustaining treatment. The parent states, "I would like their sibling to be here, but I'm not sure if that is a good idea." Which of the following is the best response by a nurse?

- A. "What concerns do you have about having the sibling present?"
- B. "Our child life therapist can help prepare the sibling for what will happen."
- C. "We require siblings to be a certain age. How old is the sibling?"
- D. "The medical team supports the presence of siblings during end of life."

**Answer: A**

Explanation:

In end-of-life situations, especially involving pediatric patients, psychosocial support must extend to the entire family. When a parent expresses uncertainty or ambivalence, the nurse's role is to facilitate open communication and explore parental concerns without imposing judgment or directives.

"Effective psychosocial care requires assessment of family readiness and emotional state. Nurses should encourage family expression of feelings and help clarify concerns before offering direction or education." (Referenced from CCRN Pediatric - Direct Care: Psychosocial Support and Palliative Care) By asking about the parent's concerns, the nurse promotes a therapeutic relationship and gains insight into the family's emotional and cultural dynamics, allowing further support or child life referrals as needed.

**NEW QUESTION # 30**

After a disaster drill, several issues related to notification of personnel and their role in the disaster were revealed. Which action should be done first?

- A. Discuss the issues with the directors of each department involved
- B. Perform a root cause analysis of the various issues identified
- C. Examine all protocols related to communication during disasters
- D. Identify each problem that occurred during the exercise

**Answer: D**

Explanation:

The first step in quality improvement or post-event evaluation—such as after a disaster drill—is to systematically identify all problems or deviations from expected protocols. Only once the problems are fully defined can root causes be analyzed and process improvement initiated.

"After-action reviews following drills or emergencies should begin with problem identification.

Comprehensive review and categorization of issues precede root cause analysis and protocol modification." (Referenced from CCRN Pediatric - Professional Caring and Ethical Practice: Systems-Based Practice and Quality Improvement)
