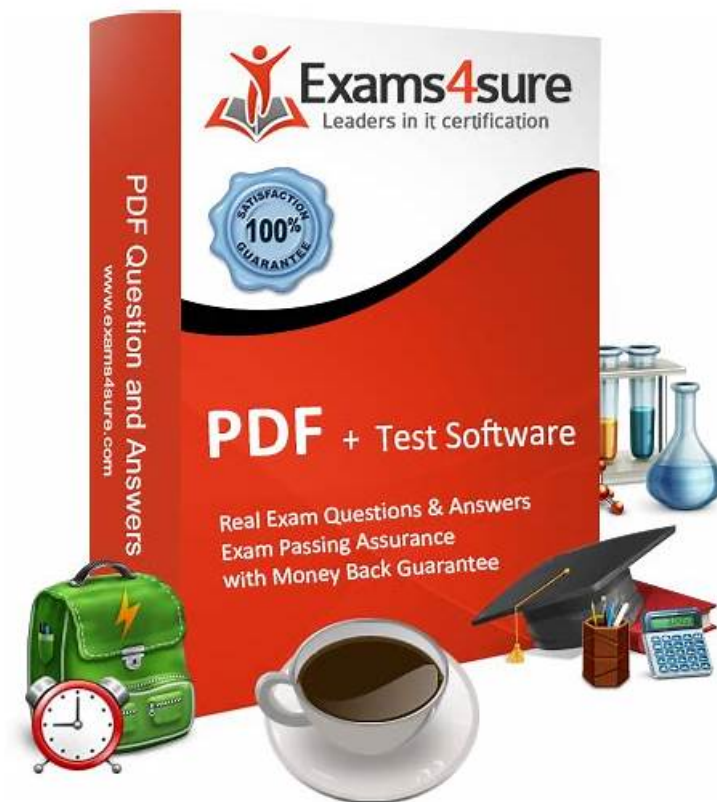

The e1 is intended for smaller organizations or those with limited resources, covering a subset of controls that address basic hygiene. The i1 provides expanded coverage beyond e1, testing against controls deemed critical for medium assurance levels. By contrast, the r2 is the most rigorous and risk-tailored assessment, covering a broader and more detailed control set. Targeted assessments are specialized and do not focus broadly on hygiene. Therefore, the e1 and i1 assessments are the correct answers.

HITRUST enforces a strict separation of duties to maintain assessor independence. External assessors are prohibited from remediating controls for their clients. Their role is to evaluate, test, and validate, not to design or implement fixes. If an assessor directly assists in remediation, they compromise their independence and introduce conflicts of interest. This situation undermines the credibility of the assurance program. In the example, because David assisted in remediation, he cannot objectively validate the effectiveness of the same control. The client would need to use separate consulting resources for remediation while retaining the assessor for independent validation. This rule preserves the integrity and impartiality of the certification process.

Scoring in HITRUST follows a roll-up model. Requirement Statements are scored at the most granular level.

These scores are then averaged to determine the score of the Control Reference. Once all control references within a domain are scored, their averages are rolled up to calculate the Domain Score. Domain scores are critical because HITRUST requires each domain in an r2 assessment to achieve at least a 71 to qualify for certification. This hierarchical scoring ensures that weaknesses in individual controls impact the higher-level domain score, maintaining balance across domains. Without averaging, entities could potentially offset poor control performance in one area with excellence in another, which would distort the overall risk picture.

Even though there are gaps within individual requirement statements, the Control Reference as a whole is performing above the threshold, meaning a CAP is not mandatory. However, the gaps must still be documented, and remediation may be encouraged, but they will not block certification. This policy ensures that CAPs are only required where deficiencies present material risk to certification.
