### NEW QUESTION # 36

Which of the following best defines a profession?

Society relies on professionals precisely because the layperson lacks this specialized knowledge to properly evaluate the safety, efficacy, or quality of the technical work being performed. This is why the government grants professions the right to self-regulate: because only those who possess this advanced, specialized knowledge are fully equipped to assess the competency and ethical practice of their peers. Therefore, while public service is the ethical core, specialized intellectual knowledge is the foundational, defining characteristic of the occupation itself.

However, professional protocol dictates a specific chain of escalation. A single technologist generally does not have the resources, authority, or specialized training to safely "clean up" toxic waste on their own (Option A), which could cause further harm. While reporting to an external environmental regulator (whistleblowing) is required if the company refuses to act (Option B), the ethical first step is to report the situation internally to the appropriate person in the organization, such as a direct supervisor, the environmental compliance officer, or upper management. This fulfills the duty of fidelity to the employer by giving the company the immediate opportunity to halt the illegal activity, initiate emergency response protocols, and self-report to the authorities as required by environmental law.

This requirement ensures that every single regulated member actively maintains, upgrades, and broadens their technical and ethical competency throughout their entire career. Compliance must be tracked, reported, and audited (contradicting Option A) to ensure

that the public can continually trust the protected designations (like C.Tech. and C.E.T.) to represent current, safe, and effective professional practice.

#### NEW QUESTION # 39

A regulated member of ASET is asked by a client to review the designs of a member from another organization in secret. The work under review does not have any implications for public safety or involve any proprietary matters, such as trade secrets. If a professional is hired to review someone else's work, ethical courtesy dictates that they must notify the original author that their work is being reviewed, unless doing so would facilitate a cover-up of a critical safety hazard or violate strict corporate trade secrets. Because this scenario explicitly states there are no public safety implications or trade secrets involved, the demand for "secrecy" is merely a client preference that violates professional collegiality. The member should refuse to conduct the review in secret, advising the client that ethical standards require notifying the original author before proceeding with the review.

#### NEW QUESTION # 40

A regulated member of ASET receives a phone call from a client requesting information about one of the member's other clients. Which of the following actions should the member take?

Confidentiality is a cornerstone of professional ethics. The ASET Code of Ethics explicitly requires members to act with integrity and maintain confidentiality regarding the business affairs, technical processes, and personal data of their clients and employers.

Information gathered during a professional relationship legally and ethically belongs to the client, not the technologist. Therefore, a professional cannot freely or even partially share one client's information with another, even if the clients are in the same industry or the member believes the information is harmless. However, saying "do not under any circumstances share" is technically incorrect, as confidentiality can be waived by the owner of the information. The correct and ethical procedure, if a member believes sharing the information could be mutually beneficial or is necessary, is to explicitly request permission (informed consent) from the client whose information is being sought. Only after receiving clear, preferably written, authorization from the original client can the member legally and ethically share that specific information.
