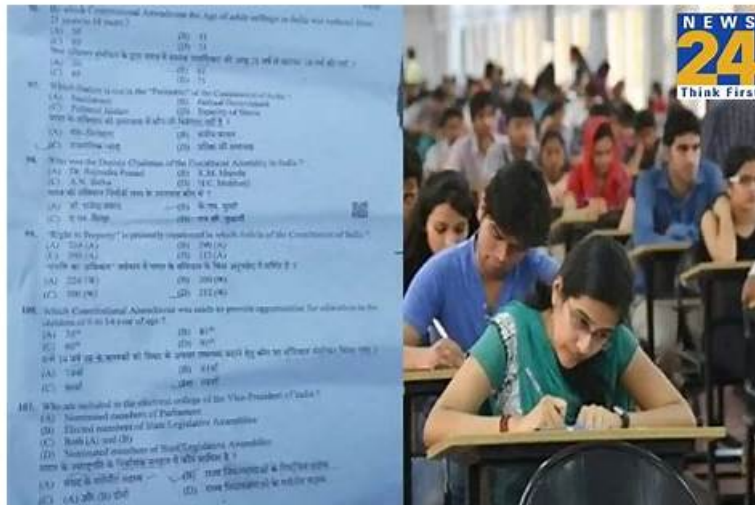

NEW QUESTION # 67

What is the purpose of Canada's Copyright Act?

- A. To allow an individual to claim credit for work that is not their own

If a proposed construction activity-such as massive, unauthorized deforestation within a 1 km radius-is not explicitly noted and approved in the environmental reports, proceeding with it (Option A) could violate provincial and federal environmental protection laws (such as CEPA or wildlife protection acts), leading to severe legal penalties and ecological damage. Simply driving over it (Option B) also causes unassessed damage. The professional course of action is to halt the proposed deviation and consult with the environmental experts or the contractor who prepared the ESA. They must assess whether the proposed clearing requires a new permit, a Phase 2 assessment, or an alternative logistical approach that minimizes environmental impact.

Thus, their sole statutory function is to investigate complaints.

The member's actions financially damaged the client and severely compromised the integrity of their employer's consulting practice.
