

Standing on chairs is unsafe and violates warehouse safety standards; proper ladders or lifts must be used instead. Shelf spacing (e.g., 10 inches) is not relevant to ergonomic technique. Positioning light items for controlled lifting aligns with CLT principles of efficient, safe storage and retrieval in warehouse environments.
