Why A is correct

"Use broad estimation ranges for high-uncertainty work and refine estimates as more information becomes available." This fits AgilePM very well because it acknowledges reality: some work is more uncertain than other work.

Broad early estimates are often more honest and useful than false precision.

Why C is correct

"Identify key assumptions behind estimates and revisit them regularly as the project evolves." This is also strongly aligned. Estimates are shaped by assumptions, and AgilePM expects those assumptions to be made visible and rechecked as learning increases.

Why the other options are incorrect

* B is too absolute. AgilePM still expects useful estimation even when uncertainty exists.

* D is contrary to agile thinking because fixed early estimates create false certainty.

* E is not appropriate because uncertain work should still be considered in planning, even if estimated at a higher level.

So the best answers are A, C .

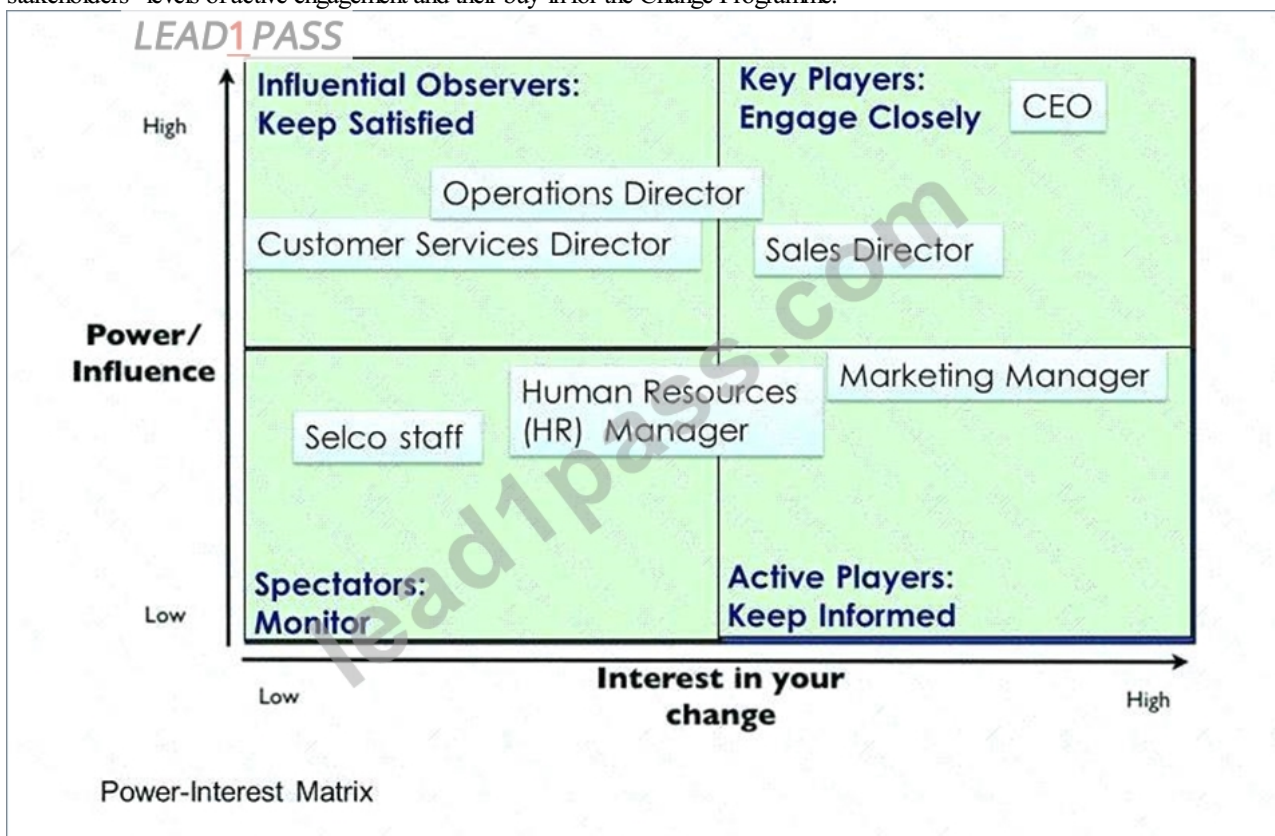

- * Rationale: Deployment phases are usually not a one-time, final phase but occur incrementally as part of the timeboxed development. Additionally, the assessment of whether the expected benefits have been achieved is part of the benefits realization process and not necessarily the sole reason to have a final Deployment phase post-Timebox C.

* Analysis: The Operations Director is an influential observer with high influence but low interest.

Increasing their interest ensures their alignment with the program goals, making them Key Players. The reason provided directly explains why this move is necessary.

* Conclusion: Both the assertion and reason are correct, and the reason directly explains the assertion.

answer: A (True, True AND the reason explains the assertion).

3. Assertion: It is appropriate to manage the involvement of Selco staff by regularly sending them progress updates.

Reason: Spectators only require regular information updates to maintain their interest in the change.

* Analysis: Selco staff are categorized as "Spectators," indicating they have low influence and interest.

Regular updates are sufficient to keep them informed without unnecessary engagement. The reason aligns with stakeholder management strategies for Spectators.

* Conclusion: Both the assertion and reason are correct, and the reason directly supports the assertion.

A: (True, True AND the reason explains the assertion).

4. Assertion: The Human Resources Manager needs to be managed and moved to the Key Players quadrant.

Reason: People with specialist skillsets should be categorized with a high level of influence and power in any change.

* Analysis: The Human Resources Manager currently resides in the "Active Players" quadrant. While they contribute specialist skills, this does not necessarily justify elevating them to "Key Players," who must also possess significant influence. The reason, while true, does not align with the change scenario.

* Conclusion: The assertion is false, but the reason is true. answer: D (False, True).

Risks are identified, discussed, reviewed, and responded to throughout the lifecycle using iterative planning, stakeholder engagement, feedback loops, and frequent inspection points.

Why C is correct

"AgilePM embeds risk management in processes, proactively addressing risks at multiple levels." This is a core AgilePM concept.

Risk is not handled separately from delivery. Instead, it is built into the way the project works through:

- * iterative planning,
- * prioritization,
- * collaboration between business and technical roles,
- * incremental delivery,
- * frequent reviews,
- * and ongoing reassessment of assumptions and dependencies.

AgilePM recognizes that risks may emerge from both:

- * the external environment such as regulation, price changes, or market shifts, and
- * the project approach such as weak communication, poor alignment, or misunderstood priorities.

Because of this, risk management must happen at multiple levels across the project, not only in formal risk logs.

Why D is correct

Reviews, demonstrations, and feedback events are important mechanisms for exposing:

- * misalignment with business goals,

AgilePM relies on iterative feedback because it helps the team identify risks early enough to respond before they become major failures. A Sprint Review, for example, may reveal that a feature is not fit for purpose, that dependencies were missed, or that stakeholder expectations were misunderstood. That is exactly how AgilePM uses feedback to reduce risk progressively.

Why the other options are not the best answers

A). AgilePM allows Mira Bachar to adjust Backlog priorities with advice from Sukra Aroon and Hira to address risks.

This is plausible in practice, because reprioritization can indeed be used to respond to risk. However, it is more of a specific situational example than a broad statement of AgilePM's overall risk approach. Since the question asks for the two statements that describe the approach itself, C and D are stronger and more directly aligned.

B). AgilePM removes all risks before execution, prioritizing avoidance over mitigation.

This is incorrect. AgilePM does not assume all risks can be removed before work begins. In fact, AgilePM accepts uncertainty as normal and focuses on:

- * early visibility,
- * continuous adaptation,
- * mitigation,
- * and learning through iteration.

Trying to eliminate all risk upfront would be unrealistic and contrary to agile thinking.

E). AgilePM assigns risk management solely to the Project Manager, Hira.

This is incorrect. In AgilePM, risk management is a shared responsibility. The Project Manager plays an important coordinating role, but risks are also surfaced and addressed by:

- * business roles,
- * technical roles,
- * delivery teams,
- * and stakeholders.

For example:

- * Mira may reprioritize work to reduce value risk,
- * Sukra may identify architectural or feasibility risks,
- * Brinda may highlight business alignment risks,
- * Hira may coordinate mitigation and escalation.

AgilePM perspective

AgilePM manages risk by making the project:

- * visible,
- * collaborative,
- * iterative,
- * feedback-driven,
- * and adaptable.

Rather than depending only on formal reporting or one person's control, AgilePM spreads risk awareness across the project and uses regular events and evolving plans to keep risk under active management.

Therefore, the best two answers are:
