


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To be eligible to take the CCRN-P certification exam, a nurse must possess a valid and current RN license, have at least 1,750 hours of direct bedside patient care in a pediatric critical care setting, and have completed at least 25 hours of pediatric-specific continuing education within the last two years. Nurses who meet these requirements are encouraged to take the exam and earn the right to use the CCRN-P certification credential.
