time), mitigation (taking actions to reduce the risk), and related response or treatment options to decide what to do with residual risk. That sequence-classification, identification, assessment, monitoring, mitigation, and response-completes the risk management life cycle. It does not stop at evaluation or reporting; it includes active monitoring, control, and reaction to risks over time.

This division helps maintain clarity, separation of concerns, and consistency in how principles are documented and governed.
