When this happens, a standard git push fails silently or is rejected by the remote without throwing a standard build compilation error. The recognized DevOps workaround for this specific Cloud Manager Git integration is to configure the Jenkins post-build Git publisher to perform a "force push" to overwrite the remote branch.
