SPIKES - Answer- Setting up interview, assessing patient Perception, obtaining patient's Invitation to disclose information, giving Knowldege and information to patient, addressing patient's Emotions, Strategy and Summary

Canada Health Act - Answer- Accessibility, Comprehensiveness, Portability, Public administration, Universality

HTN - Answer- 135/85 on 3 separate occasions. >=180/110 on dedicated office visit, or diabetes >= 130/80

ACR for DM and CKD - Answer- ACR > 30 mg/mmol is abnormal

When to start management of HTN - Answer- BP>160/100 or >140/90 when pt has other RF like diabetes and smoking

Pharmacological for HTN - Answer- HTN alone = thiazide, HTN + atherosclerosis = ACEI, HTN + postMI = beta blockers, HTN + DM = ACEI

Preeclampsia-eclampsia - Answer- HTN with proteinuria AFTER 20 weeks of gestation

Sx of preeclapmpsia - Answer- Visual disturbance, new onset h/a, epigastric or RUQ pain, rapidly progressing peripheral edema, rapid weight gain

Px of preeclampsia - Answer- Positive roll over test (>=15 dBP increase), vasospasm/retinal edema, clonus (severe preeclampsia), RUQ tenderness

Protein in urine preeclampsia - Answer- >=300 mg/d of protein

Treatment of preeclampsia - Answer- Delivery, betamethasone (<34 weeks gestation), mg sulphate

Malignant HTN - Answer- HTN emergency: BP >180/120 with retinal hemorrhages, excudates or papilledema. May also have malignant nephrosclerosis

Hypertensive encephalopathy - Answer- HTN emergency: BP >180/120 with cerebral edema

Mx of malignant HTN - Answer- Reduce dBP to 100-105 over 2-6 hours (initial fall in BP should not exceed 25% of current BP)

NEW QUESTION #227

An investigator interested in the etiology of neonatal jaundice conducted a study where he selected 150 children diagnosed with this condition and 150 children born in the same time period and in the same hospital who did not have a diagnosis of neonatal jaundice. He then reviewed the delivery records of their mothers to determine various prenatal and perinatal exposures. This is an example of which one of the following?

A 62-year-old woman is taken to the operating room for an elective laparoscopic cholecystectomy. Induction of anesthesia triggers a severe hypertensive crisis that ultimately resolves after administration of a 5 mg bolus of phentolamine.

Which one of the following is most consistent with this presentation?

- A. Increased thyrotropin (thyroid-stimulating hormone) level
- B. High plasma cortisol
- C. Low renal vein renin
- D. Low urinary metanephrines
- E. Elevated plasma catecholamines

Answer: E

Explanation:

This presentation is classic for an undiagnosed pheochromocytoma, which causes episodic or crisis-level hypertension due to excess catecholamines. Anesthesia or surgical manipulation can trigger massive catecholamine release, leading to hypertensive crisis. Phentolamine, an alpha-blocker, is the appropriate treatment.

Low metanephrines (E) would argue against pheochromocytoma. TSH (A), cortisol (D), and renin (C) are unrelated to acute intraoperative hypertensive episodes of this nature.

The patient is confused, disoriented, barely sleeps at night and has complex visual hallucinations of animals running through his room.
