A 5-year-old with a history of congenital hydrocephalus and VP shunt placement at four weeks of age is admitted with increased somnolence, decreased appetite, and increased complaints of headache. This morning the child vomited twice. The nurse should anticipate:

The definitive diagnosis is made by a CT scan and a shunt series. Surgical intervention for a shunt revision would be indicated.

Nurses should encourage family expression of feelings and help clarify concerns before offering direction or education." (Referenced from CCRN Pediatric - Direct Care: Psychosocial Support and Palliative Care) By asking about the parent's concerns, the nurse promotes a therapeutic relationship and gains insight into the family's emotional and cultural dynamics, allowing further support or child life referrals as needed.
